Department for Education (DfE) Keeping Children Safe in Education (KCSiE)

Keeping children safe in education 2025

Published 1st July 2025, KCSiE introduces limited technical changes, the full version of KCSiE 2025 will come into force on 1^{st} September 2025, focusing on safeguarding practices in educational settings.

Some Key changes and updates

1. **Updated Safeguarding Harms**: Updated guidance will Include a revised list of online safeguarding harms encompassing:

- misinformation
- disinformation,
- conspiracy theories

This reflects the growing concern of the impact of harmful online content on children.

2. Statutory Attendance Guidance: Working Together

to Improve School Attendance guidance now statutory, emphasizing the importance of maintaining accurate attendance records and sharing them with the DfE. 3. **Future Revisions**: The DfE indicates future versions of

KCSIE will reflect ongoing legislative developments, Including:

- The Children's Wellbeing and Schools Bill
- Strategies to address violence against women and girls.

This suggests a commitment to continuously improving safeguarding practices in schools.

Latest update from Ofcom

From 25th July 2025, all sites and apps that allow pornography will need to have <u>strong age checks</u> in place, to make sure children can't access it or other harmful content.

Why?

- 8% cent of children aged 8-14 in the UK visited an online porn site or app in a month, including 3% of 8–9-year-olds.
- Boys aged 13-14 were mostly likely to visit a porn service.
- Ofcom's research also shows the vast majority of adults (80%) support age checks on online pornographic sites as a means of protecting children.

How Ofcom will enforce the rules

- Ofcom expects sites and apps to engage with them and comply with their duties under the new rules.
- Ofcom will be able to impose fines of up to £18m or 10% of their qualifying worldwide revenue (whichever is greater).
- In most serious cases, Ofcom can ask a court to impose sanctions on third parties, such as internet providers.

- 1. Improve your email security, watch the video <u>Take your email security to another level</u>
- 2. Combine three random words to create a password consider the use of '<u>three random words'</u>
- 3. Learn how to turn on two-step verification (2SV) <u>NCSC 2SV guidance</u>
- 4. Do not ignore reminders to update devices Install the latest software and app updates
- 5. Use Password Managers to safely store passwords: NCSC guidance on use of browsers and apps
- 6. Don't risk losing important data including photos! <u>NCSC guidance on backing up date</u>
